An Obstinate Fact By David C. Mauldin

In some ways, Easter reminds me of a good mystery story. Although, instead of life being taken, life is given. And the question is not "Who done it?" but "Did God do it?" An open-minded seeker, like a detective in a story, must shift the evidence and make an inference to the best explanation. If you like a good mystery, I recommend Lee Strobel's book *The Case for Christ*. In it, he details his own search for the truth.

I made the search myself many years ago. Among the evidence that persuaded me were:

- the witnesses to the empty tomb (even Jesus' enemies admitted as much)
- the fact that skeptics become believers (especially Jesus' brother James)
- the fact that women appear as the first witnesses (a detail unlikely to be invented)
- the shape of early Christian belief—Why did they insist that Jesus was the Messiah, even though he was crucified? Why did Jews claim he is God? Why did they change their day of worship? Why did they change their doctrine of resurrection as they did?

Easter presents us with an odd assortment of facts. How can we account for them? A lot depends on how open you are to belief in God. Many who are not open to God simply throw up their hands and say, "I cannot make sense of it, but since we know resurrection is impossible, then it cannot have happened." If, however, you are

at least open to the *possibility* of God, the evidence becomes quite compelling.

I enjoy a good mystery novel from time to time. Among Agatha Christie's many mystery novels is one called *The Blue Train*. In it, her memorable character Hercule Poirot puzzles over a crime. All the evidence seems to point to one suspect. The police make an arrest, but have they got the right person? One fact troubles Poirot considerably. Everything seems clear enough but for this one obstinate fact. His doubt causes him to keep looking until he uncovers the truth.

For me, the resurrection of Jesus has always been that one obstinate fact that kept me looking. We have questions we cannot answer: Given so much evil and suffering, how can God be loving and all-powerful? Why does God let certain things happen? Let's face it; life is full of mysteries. Sometimes a large body of evidence points away from faith—especially if you can't make sense of your own suffering. Why not give up on faith—on God? Because of that one obstinate fact: Jesus is alive.

Because I know Jesus is alive, I must keep looking for answers. And even when I am unable to get to the bottom of things, I can trust that God's truth goes much deeper than my sight can penetrate.

I hope you know the Living Savior. If not, I hope you will keep an open and inquisitive mind. If so, then you have the most important clue to the meaning and mystery of life. One obstinate fact that will not let you rest with easy answers. One true fact that will not let you give up on God. Jesus is alive. Have a blessed Easter.

Series: Lent with Bonhoeffer





Summer Mission Trip to Puerto Rico

She lives alone in her family's home and has no one left around to help her fix and maintain the house, so we developed a plan and

worked on a series of repairs that we plan to continue working on this summer. We have also been in contact with a Christian camp: Camp Caribe in Ponce, Puerto Rico. This camp provides a Christian environment, fun, relaxation, and discipleship to youth from all over the region. They have requested our help as well, so we will gladly have our team of workers at their disposal.

We are hoping to make this trip not only memorable but life-changing. Each team member pays a portion of their trip, but we will be looking to raise support for the

projects that we'll be working on. In the months to come, please watch for details about our fundraising efforts and seek out opportunities where you can partner with us in prayer, in finances, or in any other way. This is a church-wide mission.

April Prayer Theme: Struggling with Doubt and Unbelief

John chapter 20 tells the story of Jesus appearing to several disciples after the resurrection, but Thomas was not among them. When they later told Thomas they had seen the Lord, he said: "Unless I see in his hands the mark of the nails, and place my finger into the mark of the nails, and place my hand into his side, I will never believe." (John 20:25)

Eight days later when Thomas was with them, Jesus appeared and asked Thomas to use his finger and hand to touch his wounds and urged him to believe. Then Jesus said to him [Thomas], "Have you believed because you have seen me? Blessed are those who have not seen and yet have believed." (emphasis added) (John 20:29)

Don't Be a Doubting Thomas

Ways to counter doubt and unbelief:

- Pray, praising God for the gifts of His Son and salvation.
- Read Bible verses of assurance. (1 John 5:9, 12 & 13, Rom 8:1, Acts 13:39 & 16:31, John 5:24)
- Recall the circumstances around the moment in time you came to first acknowledge your faith.
- Recall God's faithfulness to you in the past.
- List all the ways God has blessed you.
- Recite a favorite Bible verse or poem on trust.

PCPC Book Nook by Carolyn Hermann




PCPC Hilltoppers

Casual Wednesday Study Coming Soon:

Seeking Allah, Finding Jesus

Beginning April 24, Pastor David will be leading a video-based study, *Seeking Allah, Finding Jesus.* The course will run 8 weeks until June 12. Each week we will watch the video then discuss. Here is how the press release describes it:

"Building on the powerful story and arguments he shared in *Seeking Allah, Finding Jesus,* author Nabeel Qureshi takes viewers deeper into apologetics and evangelism among Muslims with this complete video lecture course. In eight sessions of about 30 minutes each he explores Muslim culture, the most common Muslim objections to Christianity, and the core doctrines upon which Islam stands or falls. Compassionate and clear, Nabeel's lectures will be a useful

training tool for pastors, outreach leaders, and any believers wanting to winsomely engage Muslims in spiritual conversations.

Seeking Allah, Finding Jesus Video Study develops in further detail the objections to Islam and case for Christianity that Qureshi introduced in Seeking Allah, Finding Jesus. When used with the accompanying Seeking Allah, Finding Jesus Study Guide, this accessible course is perfect for adult classes, small groups, segments in college or seminary courses, and motivated independent learners alike."

- Dietrich Bonhoeffer found strength in the Psalms. He said that when we pray the Psalms, we pray them with Jesus Christ. He began each day with a psalm.
 Begin each day with a psalm.
- 2. Dietrich Bonhoeffer gave his students a verse to meditate on each week. Meditate on a verse throughout the week. At some point during the week, spend 10 minutes in silence reflecting on the verse, write down as many insights as you can.

Week of March 31 – 2 Corinthians 5:17 Week of April 7 – Philippians 3:13-14 Week of April 14 – Psalm 118:4 Week of April 21 – John 20:29

- Dietrich Bonhoeffer wrote letters to encourage friends and family.
 Write a letter of encouragement to someone this week.
- 4. Dietrich Bonhoeffer loved people and the church. **Bring a friend with you to a Holy Week service.**
- 5. Dietrich Bonhoeffer gave his life for his faith and calling. Give a sacrificial gift. That is, take the money you would have spent on a new pair of shoes, dinner out, or a trip, and donate it to the church or a worthwhile ministry. (The youth mission trip comes to mind.) The point is to give up something for the sake of giving.
